

I look forward to meeting all of you during 2006.




Some members may not be interested in dragging their boats to events unless there is water for them to use it in.

# Springtime is a good time for safety checks

With spring making hints of sticking around in the Rockies, it is a good time to review some basic tips on boating safety to ensure that your boat will be ready to launch this summer.

Winter lay-up is a great time to inspect your boat's safety equipment. Just as it is important to periodically inspect a wooden boat for signs of rot and decay, your boat's safety gear needs to be maintained in order to be effective.

Lifejackets or Personal Floatation Devices (PFDs) are relatively inexpensive and should be

replaced when they are no longer serviceable. Check seams for wear and consider attaching a whistle and signaling mirror to each lifejacket for added security. PFDs should also be protected from prolonged exposure and not used as fenders where they could become damaged.

Most importantly, make sure to stow PFDs where they are easily accessible, or better yet, wear them. In an emergency, every second counts!


There are several excellent inflatable PFDs available that are light and very comfortable to wear. Just remember, however, that inflatable PFDs must be worn in order to comply with federal requirements.

Fire extinguishers should also be maintained and mounted where they are easily accessible. If in doubt, replace your boat's fire extinguishers and make sure that you and your passengers are familiar with their use.

On the subject of fire prevention, don't forget to make a thorough check of your boat's fuel and electrical systems for potential leaks or loose contacts as well. In this regard, it is important to check that your battery terminals are covered, preferably inside a plastic battery container, and protected from accidental arcing. Even attempting to jump start a dead battery inside an engine compartment can lead to disaster.

And in anticipation for next season's end, remember that laying up your boat for winter, it is important to remember that boats stored on trailers should be winterized earlier than boats stored in the water since water retains heat longer than air. At the same time, be sure to check that your boat's petcocks are not clogged or rusted and that water fully drains from all sea strainers to reduce the risk of a frozen engine block.

Performing regular maintenance of your boat's engine and safety gear is not only cost-effective, but it is also good seamanship.
