There are a lot of wonderful things about Grand Lake, Colorado. Situated as it is at the edge of Rocky Mountain National



### La Fete Internationale de La Mer et Des Marins 2012 by Bob Phillips

It's all Jeff Waco's fault. In 2008 Jeff loaned to me several boating magazines from his vast library, and in one I noticed a large and inviting ad for Brest 2008, an international-scale sailing event and celebration of maritime culture and sport. Brest? Where is that? France! With a little digging and on-line investigations, I quickly assigned such a trip to my personal "bucket list" of things to do.



This year, four years later, my family and I visited France with the Brest show and other places of interest in NW France in queue. Brest is located on a bay at the farthest western point of France in the Brittany region. Most of the pre-WW2 city of Brest was annihilated by allied forces

> bombing because of the German sub base located there. The city has, of course, rebuilt, and the water-front area where La Penfeld river enters still proudly presents the historic fort that protected the area for many years. The maritime event is hosted every 4 years at Brest for only sailing vessels. Each year selected countries are featured. This year featured countries were Norway, Russia, Mexico, Indonesia and Morocco.

The show included modern and historic (replica) ships

square-rigged vessels, replica

Viking ships, all manner of schooners, tall ships, displays of elegant ship models, outdoor sound

stages with instrumental, vocal, and ensemble performances, beer, food, more food, vendors of all kinds from one horizon to the other, outdoor theatrical presenters, maritime trades demonstrations, street actors, museum collections, ship tours in dock and at sea, night-time ship parades, fireworks, and scientific and educational pavilions. For those who may have a soft spot for maritime culture and sailing lore, this is a great event to witness and experience. Now THAT'S a classic wooden boat!

regions in Brittany, Normandy, and selected sites in the Loire Valley. Much of Europe had sustained wet and overcast weather for months. During our visit the weather cleared and this showed the lush country sides, active streams and rivers. We spent time at the Normandy invasion sites and preserved medieval towns, marveled at the many churches, abbeys, and cathedrals, some cloaked in green moss and ivy from over 800+ years. We visited several recommended chateaus in the Loire Valley region. The gardens were beyond description.



### Wonder Years by Jeff Waco

Many of you have seen "Wonder Years" at our static shows but few know the story behind this rare boat. I got bit by the boating bug very early in life, probably around five years of age. I'd look at the advertisements of Chris Craft and Century in Life Magazine and other publications. At about that time, my mother started to buy boating magazines for me. That is how I learned to read according to my mom.

At about ten years old, I sent away for the latest Chris Craft catalog. I always checked all the boxes as to which models I was interested in. When the catalog came, I saw a new model—a 1955 16' Express Cruiser Kit boat. It was just what I wanted, and it was only \$355. It wasn't doable. No money; my family lived in an apartment; not conducive for boat building. Nevertheless, at 10 years old, this boat became my dream. Over the years I saw a number of these boats in the NY area. When I was about 15, I found one that had been sunk and could be bought for \$50. It might as well have been \$5000 for I had no money.

I never forgot about this model kit boat, and I started to actively look for this boat about twenty-five years ago. During summers back east, I would comb boatyards from New Jersey to Connecticut looking for one. I realized that these boats were not made to last. They were meant to be bought cheaply, used and then thrown away.

In 1999 my wife and I came back from NY where we spent our summer on our boat. I was looking at the Boats for Sale in the now defunct Rocky Mountain News. There it was— a 16' Chris craft kit boat for sale. When I spoke to the owner, he had told me that his father had bought the boat when he was 10 years old, and he helped in the construction. This was meant to be. When we got up to Bailey, we saw the boat sitting in the woods. There was no question I would buy the boat. I later learned that it was mainly used on Grand Lake. The whole family, cousins, aunts, uncles learned to waterski on the boat. The owner used the boat all through college and slept overnight many times with his friends.

When I took the boat home and examined her closely I realizes she was in fairly good condition after staying outside for so long. The high altitude and cold helped preserve her. It did not take long to finish the boat and she was ready to be put on display at the Convention Center. I don't remember the year, but it was before the light rail was put in. We had our display in the lobby at the time.

I invited the former owner to come down, and the whole family came. They told a lot of stories about their great experiences growing up with the boat. She was a happy boat except for the eight years she sat in the woods. I had named her "Wonder Years" from the show on television depicting life in the 50's. She is again a happy boat. Wonder Years resides in my garage out of the weather. The car stays outside and each time I walk into the garage a smile comes across my face. I don't what the future holds for her. I will part with her sometime but, not just yet.
